MY HAJJ

The Hajj is an annual pilgrimage to Mecca, their most holy city, by the followers of Islam. It is a religious duty to be undertaken by a very able-bodied Muslim at least once in his or her life. Somewhat comparable to this religious trek is the annual gathering in Tucson, Arizona for the Tucson Gem and Mineral Show. It occurs from the end of January through the middle of February. It is hard to pin down because there are said to be 40 different shows running at about the same time.

Several years ago, my son, Blair, announced that he had found the woman of his dreams and would marry her. I was ecstatic.
