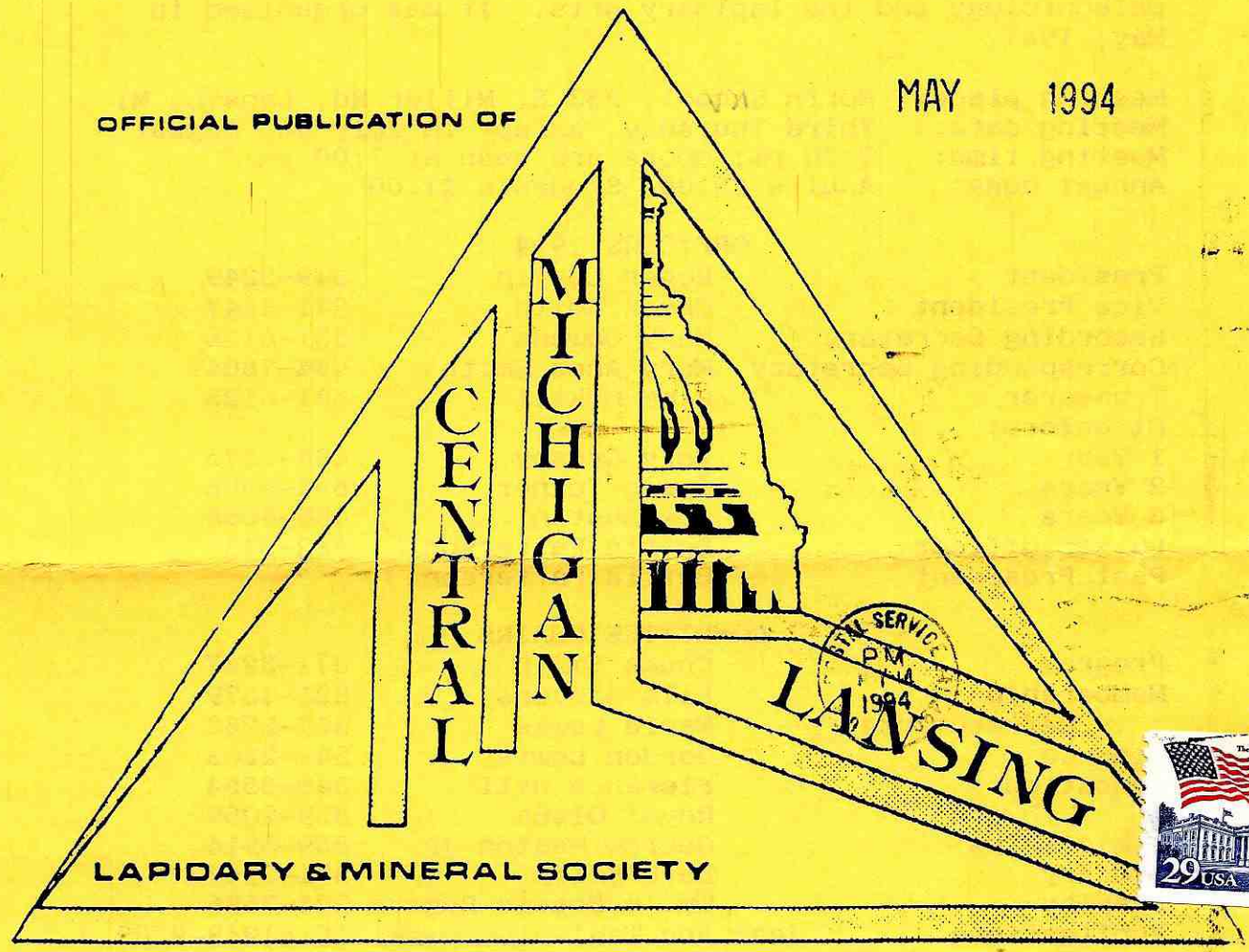

**MAY FIELD TRIP: GAMEBRIDGE ONTARIO FOSSILS**—George Heaton

A joint field trip, our CML&MS with the Scarborough Gem and Mineral Society, will be Sunday, May 29th to the Gamebridge Quarry at Gamebridge, Ontario. The meeting place will be at the corner of Highway 12 and County Rd. #15 (the road to Beaverton) at 9:00 am.

This year it is the Scarborough Ontario Club's turn to host our club on a field trip to a collecting locality on their side of the border on our holiday weekend. You will remember that last May we hosted their club to a trip to Lime City, Ohio on their Victoria Day weekend. This year Blair Campbell of the Scarborough Club is planning to take us to the quarry at Gamebridge Ontario which is on the east side of Lake Simco on Rt. 12, north of Toronto.

This collecting site will be mostly of interest to the fossil collectors in our club. We need to have something for them once in a while. This quarry is noted for its Ordovician Period fossils, especially flexicalymene trilobites, cephalopods, brachiopods, corals, crinoids and bryozoa. An occasional starfish has been found here.

The collecting in the quarry will be followed by a potluck picnic with the food provided by Scarborough Club members. The visit to the quarry will be on Sunday so you will have Saturday to travel to the Gamebridge area, Sunday to visit the quarry, and Monday to travel home on our long holiday weekend without missing work. I hope we can show the Scarborough Club a good turnout for their efforts. A lot of work goes into planning these events, and it is not always easy to get quarries to allow Sunday collecting.

To get to Gamebridge Ontario from Lansing we start by taking I-69 and I-94 to the bridge to Sarnia Ontario at Port Huron. From Sarnia we go east on Rt. 402 to Rt. 401 at London Ontario. We then take Rt. 401 east through Toronto to Whitby, where we will take Rt. 12 north to Gamebridge on the east side of Lake Simco. It is approximately 360 miles from Lansing to Gamebridge.

As for accommodations, I find two motels listed for the Beaverton-Gamebridge area in my old 1991 Ontario accommodations book. They are the Beaver Motor Hotel, recommended by Blair Campbell, with 21 units at about \$50 Canadian (Phone 705-426-4629); and, the Trent Motor Inn with 7 units at about \$50 Canadian (Phone 705-426-9864). Both of these motels are on Hwy 12 so they should be easy to find. Also at Bolsover, on Hwy 48 between Hwys. 12 & 46, there is the Port of Call Marina with 6 units at about \$45 Canadian (Phone 705-426-7522.) I expect their rates are a bit higher now. For camping I find the Talbot Leisure Centre in Beaverton, phone 705-426-7541. There are also some provincial parks clustered about Lake Simco. If you do not mind driving an hour or so to get to the quarry on Sunday morning there would be lots of motels to choose from along Rt. 401 near Whitby before you go north on Rt. 12 or at some of the towns along Rt. 12 between Whitby and Beaverton.



I will have information packets, including other area collecting localities, available at our Banquet in May.

#### EDUCATION-- Florence Hill

There will be a case at the banquet for the display of lapidary items from different members. Please call Florence at 349-3554 if you are bringing a piece to put in the case. But bring it anyway if you don't reach me ahead of time.

There will of course be no 5 minute talk. It may be well to give some thought to another basic type of rock this month-- the sedimentary rocks. The bedrock in this part of Michigan is sedimentary, but it is so deeply covered with glacial drift we seldom see it. It sometimes shows in roadcuts or streambanks and our quarries expose some forms. Sedimentary rock is laid down in beds or layers (around concretions) which sometimes show even in small specimens. Fossils are found in sedimentary rocks so they are a sure indication. Gravels sometimes have some stray sedimentary rocks which were hard enough to survive or didn't travel far during glaciation. This type of rock includes limestones, sandstones, shales, conglomerates, concretions, wind-blown loess and the evaporites salt, gypsum and anhydrite.

#### APRIL FIELD TRIP TO LIME CITY OHIO-- George Heaton

Our field trip to the Stoneco Quarry at Lime City Ohio attracted one of our largest field trip crowds with 18 people participating in this outing. As usual on field trips arranged by George Heaton, the weather was good with sunny blue skies and comfortable temperatures.

Good minerals were scarce this time, but with diligent searching some good specimens were found. Iral and Doraline Nutt found two nice fluorite specimens. Bill Henderson also found a nice large fluorite crystal in an impossible to extract position, in a very large rock, late in the morning, so I don't think he got it. Marie Lewis found some good calcite crystals. George Heaton found some celestite. Some of which was good enough for swapping material, but mostly of children's table quality. He also found a cluster of black sphalerite crystals. This is all that I saw that was worth mentioning. George Heaton was very pleased with the good turnout for this event.

#### FOSSIL GROUP NEWS-- Connie Snapp

15 people gathered for the final session on invertebrates on April 1. We have enjoyed seeing each others' fossils and learning a little bit about them. Some information on hunting locations was exchanged.

We would like to hold a couple more sessions in the fall-- one on plant fossils and one on vertebrates, but we need someone to come forward to lead them as Neil and Connie are not knowledgeable in these areas.

Many thanks go to Connie and Neil Snapp for leading the fossil study group this winter. Members benefited greatly from their expertise and the opportunity to see and examine some of their collection.

Neil has continued to work with the staff of Murphy School, Haslett in putting together a display of (mainly) Michigan rocks. Neil also continues to work with the M.S.U. Museum director, hoping to organize geologic materials available there.

Thanks also to Grit Turner and Lila Stevens for the specimens they contributed to go to Jodie Jenks minerals kits. Jodie teaches first grade at Oak Park School, Lansing.

**M.A.P.S. EXPOSITION REPORT**— Connie Snapp

Lila and Richard Stevens and Neil and Connie Snapp attended the Mid-America Paleontology Society Exposition in Macomb, Illinois on April 15 and 15. An entire ballroom, hallway and meeting room were filled with fossils. The four enjoyed a lecture by Dr. Donald Wolberg, Secretary of the Paleontology Society, entitled "Collecting Dinosaurs and Other Things: Paleontological Adventures. The talk was enhanced with slides of historical hunting adventures and cartoons. In one a dinosaur is holding a placard which says: "Repent! The Cenozoic is at hand!"

To add enjoyment to the trip, the foursome took field trips on their own to abandoned coal piles where they found lepidodendron tree trunks and to stream beds in Hamilton, IL where they found Keokuk geodes and, of course, some fossils.
