

GRAND RAPIDS FIELD TRIP, FEBRUARY 13-- George Heaton


The February field trip will be to the Michigan Natural Storage Co. Gypsum Mine in Grand Rapids, Michigan. We will meet on Saturday, February 13th at the Michigan Natural Storage Co. office at 10:00 am. Please note that this is the Saturday before our regular meeting. This is President's Day holiday weekend and my sister asked if I could have the field trip on this weekend so she and my nephew could participate in the trip. Since this is a departure from our traditional field trip date I will be willing to arrange another field trip to Grand Rapids at a later date if a significant number of people request it.

The storage company charges \$2.50 per person. Bring flashlights, lanterns, and spare batteries since the mine tunnels are dark. You will need hammers, sharp chisels, and buckets or boxes to carry tools and rocks. If you collect selenite crystals, you will also need tissue paper to wrap them. The mine is around 54 degrees, so you will probably find it most comfortable to dress in a few layers which you can adjust to your level of activity. Boots and a hard hat are also recommended.

Do not forget to bring a lunch and something to drink. We stay down in the tunnels until about 3:00pm.

Material to be collected includes massive gypsum in the form of "pencil ore" and alabaster, and gypsum crystals called selenite. I would like everyone to collect and carry out a couple of good pieces of "pencil ore" for the children's table. If everyone does this it will add up to a good quantity of material and I won't have the back-breaking job of hauling out one huge and heavy bucketful by myself. I would appreciate this very much.

To get there take I-96 to the 28th street-West exit at Grand Rapids. (This will be the 2nd 28th St. exit.) Go west on 28th St. to Clyde Park Ave, turn right (North) on Clyde Park. Take Clyde Park to Grandville Ave. and turn left (West). Grandville Ave. becomes Chicago Drive just west of Clyde Park. Take Chicago Dr. to Judd Ave. and turn right (North.) Take Judd to Michigan Natural Storage which is on the right just before the railroad tracks. Allow about 1 1/2 hours driving time from Lansing.

Agate Resources on the Web

A wealth of agate information is now available via the web from the Conservation and Survey Division (CSD), University of Nebraska-Lincoln. The agate material presented is the result of years of research and data-collection by Roger K. Pabian, CSD research geologist and paleontologist. The "web-work" was done by Duane R. Mohlman, CSD data systems coordinator and web administrator. The web site includes these four major agate attractions:

The "showcase attraction" is **The Agates Page**. As of November 1, 1998, there were 277 images. Some of these images contain multiple agates. Several of the agates include descriptive text. As time allows, text will be added for the remaining agates. Nearly one-half of the images are of agates from the United States (23 different states). The other half includes images of agates from 14 foreign countries, spanning six of the seven continents.

The **Agate Bibliography** contains nearly 3,300 literary citations. This is a compilation of papers that were searched out by Pabian and Andrejs Zarins while preparing their publication "Banded Agates, Origins and Inclusions," Educational Circular 12, Conservation and Survey Division, University of Nebraska-Lincoln.

The **Agate Lexicon** (or more formally known as the *Lexicon and Glossary of Agate, Jasper, Opal and other Amorphous, Cryptocrystalline, or Spherulitic Forms of Gem Silicon Dioxide*), contains over 2,700 named agate varieties with literary citations. The purpose of this page is to determine what named varieties of agates, jaspers, etc. are valid geologic or scientific names and what names are simply trade names that have been coined by dealers to improve sales. Valid names usually have literary citations and geographic information following the entry whereas trade names are usually followed by a citation of the advertisement in which the name was first used.

The **Nebraska Gems Page** currently contains 29 images of Nebraska gems, almost all with descriptive text. Gems from Nebraska have either formed in place right here or they have been transported into the state by streams draining mountainous areas to the west or by glaciers that originated in the north. These diverse sources give Nebraska some unusual gemstones that provide the collector and lapidary with some interesting materials as well as opportunities to learn about the geology of the state. The Nebraska Gem Page is in its early construction phase but it already includes a few entries that did not appear in "Minerals and Gemstones of Nebraska."

CARATS AND KARATS**Knowing the difference makes you a better shopper****By Frank Rowley**

CARAT: Gemstones, such as diamonds, emeralds, rubies, etc. weights are stated in carats. Carat is a unit of weight, not size or shape. A carat is equal to 1/5 gram, or you can state 5 carats = 1 gram. There are 28.35 grams in an ounce. If you have 141.75 carats of diamonds you would have 1 ounce of diamonds. A gemstone weighing less than 1 carat is expressed as "points". 100 points = 1 carat, therefore a 25 point stone would be 1/4 carat in weight. If I haven't lost you or put you to sleep try this one.

AVOIRDUPOIS OUNCE V.S. THE TROY OUNCE: (Avoirdupois is abbreviated AV) The "Noble Metals" - gold, silver and platinum are usually sold by the ounce - not our everyday Avoirdupois Ounce, but the Troy Ounce. The Troy Ounce is approximately 10% heavier than the AV Ounce, (1.097 AV Ounce - 1 Troy Ounce). If silver wire is listed at \$10.00 per ounce (Troy) it would cost 10% less, or \$9.00, if we think of it in terms of the common everyday ounce.

Gem Stones are usually sold by the common (AV) ounce, if they are being sold by their weight. Valuable Gem Stones are sold by the gram or carat. To convert a gram price into the price per ounce, multiply by 30. This is 6% too high, but it is easier to use a round number like 30 instead of the exact 28.35 grams in an ounce. So when shopping for a gem, and quoted a price of 50 cents a gram (.50 X 30 \$15.00 an ounce) or \$15.00 X 16 ounces = \$240.00 a pound or if \$2.00 per gram \$2.00 x 30 x 16 ounces = \$960.00 a pound.

KARAT: Karat is used to express the percentage of pure gold in an article. Karat is abbreviated as "K". 24 K Gold article would be pure gold (100%). 12K gold article would contain 50% gold, 18K article would be 75% pure gold. The alloying metals with gold are usually silver, copper and zinc, unless it is white gold then the alloying metals are nickel, copper and zinc.

So, at the next Gem Show, at Quartzite or at the jewelry store when the seller quotes you a price per carat, per gram or ounce you can convert or understand the pricing on the spot.
